Vision for the Primary PE and Sport Premium-All pupils leaving Dovecote Primary School to become physically literate and with the knowledge, skills and motivation necessary to equip them for a healthy, active lifestyle and lifelong participation in physical activity and sport.

Funding has been provided to ensure impact against the following objective:

To achieve self-sustaining improvement in the quality of PE and sport in primary schools. It is important to emphasise that the focus of spending must lead to long lasting impact against the vision above that will live on well beyond the Primary PE and Sport Premium Funding.

It is important that schools will see an improvement against the following 5 key indicators:

1. The engagement of all pupils in regular physical activity – kick starting healthy active lifestyles.
2. The Profile of PE and sport being raised across the school as a tool for whole school improvement.
3. Increased confidence, knowledge and skills of all staff in teaching PE and sport.
4. Broader experience of a range of sports and activities offered to all pupils.
5. Increased participation in competitive sport.

Update as of 14/11/19

1. Anomaly screens are up and running. More training is needed though on making use of them in PE lessons and break times.
2. To gain a better understanding on PE delivery and highlight areas of CPD in Spring-term 1 I will be conducting lesson visits, one teacher from each year group.

5. Dance and gymnastics teachers have been approached. Dance teacher confirmed for year 6 starting Jan 19 for a term.
